### The history of EMS Week

The U.S. Congress authorized the Emergency Medical Services Systems (EMSS) Act of 1973.

In 1974, President Gerald R. Ford signed this bill and appointed David R. Boyd as the Director of the Division of Emergency Medical Services Systems (DEMSS), Public Health Service, Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Boyd convinced President Ford to proclaim "Emergency Medical Services Week" and to host a White House Conference on EMS.

Gerald Ford is the hero of the national EMS story, a true believer who supported EMS during difficult political, economic and budgetary times.

## **EMS Safety Course debuts**

AEMT'S NEW EMS SAFETY COURSE DEBUTED on March 1 at EMS Today in Baltimore. The one-day course, taught by NAEMT'S EMS Safety Program Committee faculty, helps promote a culture of EMS safety and aims to reduce the number and intensity of injuries incurred by EMS practitioners in carrying out their work.

The course increases students' awareness and understanding of EMS safety standards and practices and develop their ability to effectively implement these practices. It is designed for all EMS practitioners, other medical professionals providing prehospital patient care, EMS supervisors and administrators.

#### Taking safety to the streets

The EMS Safety course offers an overview of current issues surrounding safety in EMS, presents and discusses case studies, builds risk assessment and decision-making skills and provides an opportunity for participants to relate their own experiences with EMS safety issues.

Students who take EMS Safety learn to:

• Identify key elements in the safe operation of an ambulance.

• Describe techniques for moving and securing patients safely.

• Recognize situations where the EMS practitioner may be at risk of violence, and how such situations may be either avoided or addressed.

• Appreciate the importance of maintaining good personal health, and the impact of EMS service on practitioners' personal health.

• Address safety elements in a variety of operational situations.

Specifically, the EMS Safety course curriculum addresses crew resource management; emergency vehicle safety; responsibilities in scene operations; patient handling; patient, practitioner and bystander safety; and personal health.



Like other NAEMT continuing education courses, the EMS Safety course is CECBEMS accredited and meets NREMT recertification requirements.

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Instructor qualifications to teach the course include successful completion of the EMS Safety provider course. Instructors who are

certified to teach AMLS, PHTLS, EPC, ITLS, ACLS, PALS, PEPP, EVOC, Fire Instructor I, or are NAEMSE certified instructors, or current faculty teaching EMS



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

The New EMS Safety Course debuted on March 1 at



EMS Today in Baltimore. The program's debut concludes the series of eight beta tests that the EMS Safety Program Committee conducted across the country in 2010. The responses from the beta tests were incorporated into the course content. The result is a streamlined, interactive, comprehensive program that lives up to its motto of "Taking Safety to the Streets." It gives stu-

dents valuable information that they can take home and use to help create a "culture of safety" within their own agencies. Now the committee's agenda moves forward from course development to implementation as committee members work to develop a cadre of instructors and enable agencies across the country to present the course to their personnel.

If you are already certified to teach AMLS, PHTLS, EPC, ITLS, ACLS, PALS, PEPP, EVOC or Fire Instructor I; or you are current faculty teaching EMS curriculum at an accredited college or university, you can become an instructor for this course simply by taking the EMS Safety provider course.

### AMLS news: New textbook and instructor materials published

THE ADVANCED MEDICAL LIFE SUPPORT (AMLS) course has had an exciting year.

The new First Edition AMLS textbook and instructor materials are now available. The AMLS Committee worked diligently over the past two years to make this the best edition ever. The new textbook and course materials define an AMLS Assessment Pathway algorithm that allows increased standardization in the assessment process. Evidence-based medical assessment, management and disease process etiologies are utilized throughout the text, along with expanded content in many chapters.

Although improvements and changes have been made, critical components of AMLS remain the same, including the assessment-based philosophy and continued endorsement by the National Association of EMS Physicians (NAEMSP). Lectures continue to be interactive, and scenario

stations remain critical to learning. The committee looks forward to receiving feedback on the new course over the coming months.

To accommodate and support the ongoing growth of the AMLS program, changes have been made within the AMLS Committee.

### EPC news: New instructor manual, medical director announced

HE EMERGENCY PEDIATRIC CARE (EPC) PROGRAM has added a new Associate Medical Director, **Doug Trocinski**, M.D., of Raleigh, N.C.

Trocinski's professional background is primarily in educa-



tion, with much experience in training emergency medicine residents. He completed his residency in Emergency Medicine at Naval Medical Center San Diego in 1997, and then a fellowship in Pediatric Emergency Medicine at San Diego Children's Hospital and Health Center in 1999. While in the Navy, he was an attending emergency medicine physician at

both the Naval Medical Center, where he later served as the assistant/associate residency director from 1999-2001, and with the Rady Children's Hospital Emergency Department, both in San Diego.

Recruited to Raleigh as the Associate Residency Director for the UNC-Chapel Hill emergency medicine residency program, he held primary responsibility for the program at WakeMed. Trocinski became residency director of the UNC program in 2004, a position that he held until July 2009. Currently, he works exclusively in the Pediatric Emergency Department, which sees about 45,000 visits per year. With more than 14 years of experience in the areas of emergency medicine, pediatrics and education, Trocinski is a welcome addition to the EPC Committee.

# PHTLS news: Course introduces Seventh Edition, e-learning option

A new online e-learning option for Prehospital Trauma Life Support (PHTLS) is now available. Eight hours of PHTLS online content has been developed that includes video and animations and is designed as a stand-alone continuing education offering. Successful completion of PHTLS Online Continuing Education earns participants eight hours of CECBEMS continuing education, but no PHTLS card will be issued. The price, including an electronic or print version of the PHTLS Seventh Edition book, is \$105.

Within the next few months, PHTLS course sites will have the opportunity to offer their students a hybrid PHTLS course, with one day of online learning and one day of classroom work. Students who successfully complete the hybrid course will earn 16 hours of continuing education credit and will receive a PHTLS card.

The PHTLS Seventh Edition civilian and military texts,

as well as the Seventh Edition Instructor DVD, are now available for purchase. The Trauma First Response text also is available. The first rollout of the Seventh Edition course in Dallas in September 2010 was attended by 300-plus faculty.



Currently, rollouts of the updated materials are occurring all over the world.

India and Singapore are planning to join the PHTLS family, and the committee is working with a United Nations team in Haiti. Additionally, PHTLS is working with UN officials to develop a training program for all medical team personnel deploying to any UN mission.

### Frame lecture to address field triage guidelines

This year's Scott B. Frame Memorial Lecture topic is Guidelines for Field Triage of Injured Patients: Making a Difference, presented by Richard C. Hunt, M.D., FACEP, Director, Division of Injury Response, National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and Professor of Emergency Medicine, Emory University School of Medicine.

The risk for death of a severely injured person is 25 percent lower if the patient receives care at a Level 1 Trauma Center. Transporting the right patient to the right place in the right amount of time can indeed save lives.

Dr. Hunt will describe the development, dissemination, implementation and evaluation of CDC's Guidelines for Field Triage of Injured Patients: Recommendations of the National Expert Panel on Field Triage. He also will discuss successes and challenges with this journey to make a difference in the outcomes of trauma patients throughout our nation.



The Frame lecture is held each year in memory of Scott B. Frame, MD, FACS, FCCM, EMT-P, who made significant contributions to NAEMT and its Prehospital Trauma Life Support (PHTLS) program.

The Scott B. Frame Memorial Lecture will take place from 2-3:15 p.m. on August 31. It is open to attendees of EMS World Expo.

### Chaplaincy provides spiritual support in critical stress management

Critical Stress Management (CSM) is a term that most of us who are either EMS practitioners or other first responders, or who support EMS practitioners, have become familiar with in the last decade. In the 1970s, I was a police officer and volunteer member of the Black Mountain, N.C., Rescue Squad. We were told to keep our emotions in check, and not to show weakness. This probably sounds very familiar.

Thankfully, those days are over. Through a CSM system, several types of support are available to EMS practitioners and their families. On the forefront of this movement was the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (www.icisf. org), which was founded in 1982. One of the now endorsed CSM support avenues is Pastoral Crisis Intervention. I was honored to be one of the co-authors of the two Pastoral Crisis Intervention Courses offered through the ICISF and the University of Maryland – Baltimore Campus.

I also am blessed that in 1990, the Lord shared a vision with me to begin a full-time Chaplain's program – the Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy. This ministry is for EMS practitioners and other first responders, their families and victims of crime. In 2010, we responded to some 1,550 emergency calls offering

on-scene support to EMS practitioners and others.

It is key to offer the appropriate support following a traumatic call. If this support is not offered, the likeli-

hood exists that stress will build up, which could potentially lead to stress that can be life-changing, i.e., post-traumatic stress disorder. The Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy serves 36 agencies; one of the major agencies that we are honored to serve is the Charleston County EMS.

NAEMT President-elect and Charleston County EMS Director **Don Lundy** states, "In our business, we are always focused on the patient. Many times, a co-worker may become a de-facto patient because of what they see and experience on the job. We use the Chaplaincy for issues that an employee may come up against, but may not want to talk with their employer about. This is a very complicated world, and many members of our EMS family experience a multitude of issues that, if not caught and worked out early, end up affecting both their jobs and our patient care."

#### Spiritual support in action

Over these 20 years, I have been requested to respond to various situations with EMS practitioners who have experienced loss. One time concerned when a medic was relieved of duty. A supervisor called me and stated that they were concerned for his safety, as he felt the fired employee may harm himself. I found him living in a his car. I asked him to go with me to talk with a professional counselor. He said he would meet me after he visited his father's grave; I told him that was not going to be an option, and he did go with me and received some much-needed help.

Some EMS systems utilize chaplains as a resource for their personnel. Some of these chaplains are local clergy, who serve the agency as a volunteer. Several agencies have full-time chaplains, as we do at the Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy, which is a non-profit ministry. We have four full-time staff, 15 volunteer chaplains and a Board of Directors (which Don Lundy has faithfully served for seven years).

Whether a clergyperson is serving an EMS agency as a volunteer or as a full-time chaplain, it is an honor to serve in this ministry with the community of EMS practitioners and other first responders. On a regular basis, a chaplain is requested to meet a crew at the emergency room following a particularly bad run, such as one involving a baby or another EMS worker. By offering a 'Ministry of Presence' every day, I pray we are making a difference in the lives of the EMS practitioners, their families and the agency.

Providing pastoral support as part of the Critical Stress Management system for our EMS personnel is so very important. Lundy comments that "The Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy has been the foundation for our 'spiritual division.' While some might think of a Chaplaincy as a Bible-carrying group, this Chaplaincy ministry for us is a part of the EMS team which offers a spiritual presence for our co-workers. I cannot think of where we would be if we did not have this group with us. They have saved quite a number of lives, marriages and families within our system."

I encourage you to contact me if I may be of assistance to your agency in either developing a Chaplaincy program or helping to maintain this ministry.

curriculum at an accredited college or university will be able to teach the EMS Safety course without prior monitoring and approval.

### EMS Safety in the news

The EMS Safety course has won the 2011 Nicholas Rosecrans Award for Excellence in Injury Prevention. The award was presented at EMS Today on March 5.

"EMS practitioners are seven times more likely than the average worker to lose work as the result of an on-the-job injury. For years, the dangers faced by EMS practitioners have been largely underestimated. It is only in recent years that we have come to recognize the unique challenges faced by EMS practitioners and the extent to which those challenges affect

them, their families, the agencies for which they work or volunteer their services, and ultimately their patients," says **Glenn Luedtke**, Chair of the EMS Safety Program Committee.

"We've created a program that not only presents the latest and most comprehensive information on EMS safety, but is constructed so that students can take the information and use it their first day back on the ambulance to improve their safety and that of their co-workers." He added, "In the long run, we hope the course will be the vital first step in creating a new 'Culture of Safety' within our profession to keep our patients safe and help ensure that our EMS practitioners return home safely after each shift."

Hurricane Preparedness and other Emergency Services/Public Safety-related topics.



### You're invited to participate in revision of ambulance safety design standards

mergency medical service practitioners riding in the back of ambulances are at high risk of suffering injuries during a crash or crash avoidance maneuver when not using restraints.

However, using restraints makes it difficult to access and treat patients while en route to the hospital. Achieving a balance between worker safety and patient care is a significant challenge for the EMS community.

To address this challenge, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Human Factors Division (HFD) has partnered with the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) and the National Institute of Occupational Safety and

the necessary information for EMS organizations and ambulance manufacturers to design safer patient compartments that help workers optimize their ability to perform patient care. The guidance will be incorporated into current and emerging ambulance design standards such as NFPA 1917.

The guidance will be developed over a three-year period. Year one will focus on developing a complete understanding of EMS requirements for the design of patient compartments. Year two will focus on developing, evaluating, and refining design concepts and criteria. Year three will focus on preparing the resultant design guidelines into language appropriate for incorporation into standards and submitting them for consideration.

To be successful at developing these ambulance design

guidelines, the EMS community – both end users and equipment manufacturers – must be involved. Over the next few years, we will be working with the EMS community to elicit input, insights and information from a broad cross-section of EMS professionals. Input will be gathered through focus groups, town hall-like meetings and workshops at EMS expos and regional shows, interviews and discussions with EMS practitioners at conferences and in their local stations, and Internet-based surveys.

We also intend to establish an advisory group composed of members of the EMS community to provide ongoing advice

and guidance to the standards development team. This will help ensure that we fully understand all the ambulance design-related

challenges faced by EMS practitioners. Ultimately, EMS participation will lead to design guidelines that have a positive impact on safety and worker performance.

### EMS on the Hill Day to be held in May

EMS PROFESSIONALS FROM ACROSS THE COUNTRY will gather at EMS on the Hill Day on May 3-4 in Washington, D.C. With a new Congress, it is critical that we educate our legislators in the Senate and

House of Representatives on EMS issues and advocate for the passage of key EMS legislation.

Last year, the EMS profession "came of age" with our first designated day for meeting with congressional leaders. Building upon that success, EMS on the Hill Day 2011 will:

– include representation from all sectors of the EMS community

- send a consistent message to our elected leaders on the key issues facing EMS in our country

– build and strengthen our relationships with Senate and House leaders and their staff

### Participate in EMS advocacy

If you were not able to register for this year's event by the March 31 deadline, there are still ways that you can actively participate in advocating for our key issues.

• Schedule meetings with your Senators and House Representative in their district office when they are at home. Try to schedule meetings around holidays, such as Easter or Independence Day, or the August or Election recesses. Congressional leaders are more often at home on Friday through Monday, as votes are most often taken in Washington, D.C. on Tuesday-Thursday. Build relationships with congressional staff who work in your district office.

• Attend town hall meetings. Participation not only allows you to share your concerns with your congressional leaders, it also gives the members of your community the opportunity to learn about the issues that have an impact on EMS.

• Letters, e-mails and phone calls do matter. When communicating with your congressional leaders, make sure that you clearly indicate your name, position that you hold in EMS, and the service at which you work. All members will receive an email later this month with directions on how they can contact their congressional leaders to advocate for key EMS issues using NAEMT's Capwiz service.

### NAEMT takes advocacy to the next level

NAEMT is taking national EMS advocacy to the next level with the creation of new positions that will help EMS practitioners become more directly involved in actively advocating within their states. The association is in the process of creating a national advocacy network by establishing a volunteer state advocacy coordinator within each state. The new positions will help build and support NAEMT's national advocacy efforts within a state and provide members with more outlets through which to participate.

State advocacy coordinators will:

- Conduct outreach to NAEMT members in the state to solicit member interest and participation in national EMS advocacy efforts
- Update interested members on the status of pending national legislation and regulation

• Coordinate and participate in visits to the district offices of the state's U.S. Senators and House Representatives to educate congressional leaders and staff about the issues that affect delivery of EMS to communities within the state

Coordinators also will build and maintain relations with the state EMS Office and foster state involvement in national advocacy campaigns. The state advocacy coordinators will report to a new position within the NAEMT Advocacy Committee, a regional advocacy coordinator. NAEMT will solicit interest in these volunteer positions through an application process to be released soon.

"I look forward to working with the new state advocacy coordinators, when appointed," says Jerry Johnston, Advocacy Committee Chair. "I think this new organizational approach will expand our advocacy outreach and enhance our overall grassroots involvement – which is core to our mission."
