Dear Chairwoman DeLauro, Ranking Member Granger, and Ranking Member Cole:

On behalf of the National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians (NAEMT), thank you for including \$6.5 million in the House FY2022 Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations bill for the Rural EMS Equipment and Training Assistance (REMSTEA) program under the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), also known as SIREN Act grants.

As you work with the FY2022 appropriations bills, we respectfully request the Labor-HHS-Education Conference Report include the Senate level of \$10 million for this critical program.

While our public and nonprofit EMS agencies proudly serve their communities, their resources are often spread thin. Rural EMS especially has long faced challenges in delivering quality emergency medical care, in part due to great distances between healthcare facilities, and low reimbursement rates. COVID-19 exacerbated these challenges faced by rural agencies, especially since rural EMS agencies may be the only healthcare providers in their area. Under normal circumstances, rural agencies rely heavily upon community fundraising efforts. However, stay-at-home orders and other limitations on community gatherings have ground these fundraising efforts to a halt.

SIREN Act grants are designed specifically for rural EMS agencies to help them with activities such as buying PPE for their personnel, providing medical supplies for COVID-19 patients, and recruiting and training more volunteers so they can continue to provide life-saving medical care to critically ill and injured patients in their communities.

Thank you for your consideration of this critical request, and for your support of EMS.
